SEND Review





The government looked at services and support for children and young people with special educational needs and disabilities and in alternative provision to look at how to improve them.

They called this the SEND Review and sent it out for to all to read in April 2022.



The government looked at what wasn't working well with SEND services and support provided by the government, local authorities, nurseries, schools, alternative provision and colleges.

The government also listened to many young people about what they thought would make things better.



Many young people said they wanted to be happy, healthy and be able to get a job when they become an adult, but at the moment many of them felt they were not getting the support needed to do this.

Many people also felt that too many children and young people with SEND, are falling behind at school and are not doing as well as they could.

In addition, many people also felt that alternative provision is not a good experience for many children and young people.



The money used to support children and young people with SEND or who are in alternative provision, is not always used in the best way.



The government also learned that the experiences and outcomes of children and young people can be different depending on where they live.

This isn't fair and needs to change.

The Government's Ideas for Change



Every area in the **country to use the same way of working** so children and young people get the support they need no matter where they live. Every area of the country to use the same way of working (**national standards**) to: decide what children and young people with SEND need and involve children, young people and their families in decisions about support.



Services such as nurseries, schools, alternative provision and colleges, health and care services, and local authorities to work together and write a **local** inclusion plan that will explain how they are going to provide good SEND and alternative provision services and support for children and young people with SEND.

Children, young people and their **families should be involved** in writing the plan. The plan will include: SEND support in mainstream schools, alternative provision and special services for children and young people with more complex needs.



The local inclusion plan will help parents see all the different services that are available in the local area.

The government want to make all educational health care plans (EHCPs) digital so they are easy to use.



Families to be able to **meet with their local authority** if they don't agree with decisions made about services and support. This will make it easier to deal with problems quickly.

The government will give **more money** for mainstream schools to improve support. They also propose to give more money for new special schools for children and young people that need them.



Staff in nurseries and schools to receive **better training** through a new qualification to support children and young people with SEND.

The government will collect information to better understand the support that children and young people with SEND need from health services.



The government will look to improve the quality of and how alternative provision works, so children and young people's needs are identified and supported earlier. This will help many of them to enjoy, stay and do well in mainstream school.

The government still wants to hear your views on their changes, to make sure they get it right. They need to know what you think by **Friday 22 July 2022.**

Government is a group of people who make decisions for a country.

Review means looking into something to find out more information about it and suggesting some possible changes to improve things.



A **green paper** is a document that sets out government's ideas for improving the way things work. They call it a green paper because they want to ask a wide range of people what they think about their ideas before finalising them.

Special educational needs and disabilities is sometimes called **SEND** for short.




An **Education**, **Health and Care Plan (EHCP)** is a plan for some children and young people with SEND that explains their needs and includes the support and services that a child or young person needs so that they are able to learn.



Local authorities are responsible for providing services in a local area.










Alternative provision helps children who need extra help to stay in and enjoy learning at their mainstream school, or provides specialist places and support for those who would benefit from spending time away from their mainstream school.

Many children and young people in alternative provision have SEND. Alternative provision also includes hospital schools which provide support and education for children and young people who are in hospital.
