

Daubeney Primary School Development Newsletter

Our School Development Priorities (SDPs) are:

- 1. Improve outcomes for the lowest attaining pupils (30%) in reading and maths
- 2. Improve writing outcomes for all, including standards of handwriting
- 3. Continue to develop high quality inclusive practice.
- 4. Continue high quality provision in KSI & EYFS
- 5. Development of leadership at all levels



Leadership & Management

The Spring term carried on from where we left off in December, with a keen eye on our key foci (see our SDPs above) to guide us on our journey of continual improvement and eagerly anticipating a visit from Ofsted with a desire to reinstate our 'Good' grading.

Since having our first School Improvement Partner (SIP) visit from Hackney Education on 28.9.22 with our SIP advisor Laleh Laverick, and our previous newsletter, we have met with HE for two TAG meetings and had a One Day Review (ODR). Both TAG meetings were positive where we shared our current attainment data, targets for our end of year attainment and our planned actions to achieve those targets. Our ODR is very much akin to an Ofsted inspection and affords HE the opportunity to quality assure the provision here at Daubeney and to confirm with teachers and pupils via lesson observations, conversations with teachers and pupils and book looks the information shared at our TAG meetings and at our SIP visits. All of the above puts us in a strong place to demonstrate the quality of our provision and how we strike a balance between having high aspirations for all of our pupils whilst balancing this against their well-being needs. To further quality assure the Leadership & Management here at Daubeney we have had two Local School Committee governor meetings, one of which also included a governor day. Please access the

Writing continues to be a focus and following CPD, teachers planned writing lessons focusing on the specific features of the genre and models of high quality text examples to support children to apply these in their own writing.

We started the term with another whole school writing moderation using a short animation as a stimulus: Years 1-3 were based on 'Marshmallows' and Year 4-6 were based on 'Something Fishy'. Children were able to apply writing skills that they had learned in the Autumn Term and showed great progress.

We then celebrated the children's writing in our first ever Writing Celebration assemblies where children from each class read work that they are proud of in assembly. This was followed by a narratives linked to whole class readers.

We celebrated National Story Telling week with an amazing story telling event. Each year group had a session with story teller Phil McDermott, who had the children enthralled and entertained with his amazing stories. This was then followed by a special evening event for Year 2, 3 and 4. The children were inspired to retell the stories as well as make up their own. Ms Lester









Maths

Maths continues to go from strengths to strength here at Daubeney! At our most recent SIP visit they narrowed down all the amazing things happening at Daubeney to three key strengths (no easy task by the way). They noted that one of those key strengths was the shared expertise in maths mastery across the whole school and pointed to the positive outcomes as evidence of this. Going forward, all staff will receive further training in the Summer Term to ensure this excellent provision continues. We have also focused heavily on support for our lowest 30% and it has been inspiring, and reassuring, to see on various learning walks that our children who fall within the lowest 30% of attainers are having their provision adapted so they are able to access the same curriculum as their peers. This is done in various ways but to name a few: teacher/adult support, scaffolding, and concrete resources.

The Spring Term also saw the return of our Times Tables Rock Stars League! It got off to a bang with some battles between all the classes from year 3 to year 6. In the last 30 days, 75% of all children from year 3 to year 6 are accessing TTRS—but obviously we'd

love to see that number rise! Can you help us by encouraging TTRS at home? A shout-out to 5C— 100% of the children in 5C accessed TTRS in the last 30 days. Close behind were 4L and 5MC with 97% and 95% respectively.

Finally, we continue to work with the North East Maths Hub—Mr Swarbrick and Ms Aneta will be attending training to help support the teaching and learning of maths in year 6.—**Mr Swarbrick**



Science

Science has always been a strength at Daubeney, and as we write to you now this is no different. Investigations continue to improve and in our last learning walk we observed children using various scientific skills to carry out scientific experiments. This focus on investigation led learning means that the children learn more and remember more. As we move towards learning which is more centred on experiential opportunities, we have decided to take science in a new direction at Daubeney, and next half-term our Year 5 team will be piloting the use of floor books in Science and CC. What this means is that the children will now work more collaboratively and will create a whole class 'floor book' which takes the reader on a journey of everything the children have been learning in their science topic. This method of recording children's learning enables the teachers to be more creative with their planning and teaching and allows the children to access more experiential



learning. Following Spring 2, we will be rolling this out to years 3 & 4 in Summer 1, and finally, we will roll out to years 2 & 6 in Summer 2. As you can see, this is something we are introducing slowly, and precisely. We will be monitoring the progress closely in year 5 and recording strengths, and areas for development. We look forward to showing you some excellent examples in our next SDP newsletter! - **Mr Swarbrick**

Creative Arts

Music

Music has really taken off due to our new music room and the results of our efforts were showcased at our winter performances and Black History Month concert. This term KS2 have been busy learning to play an environmentally conscious song called "Long way home". We have been playing this song on guitar, ukulele and keyboard in whole class instrumental lessons. The band have also been booming out this tune every Tuesday morning at 8:30am. Our school choir is still going strong and they have performed at "Stay and Play " sessions, the winter concert and our singing assembly. Daubeney is now taking part in a new engaging music project alongside our Spanish teacher. Year 5 will be the first to experience these Spanish music lessons. So here is what to look out for in the coming months; new music software to record children in the music room and preparations for a gigantic Black History Month concert at the Hackney Empire.

Computing

This half term we have had lots of fun during computing lessons!


- EYFS and Year I have computing corners set up in their classrooms, for the children to access resources related to computing continuously throughout the day.
- Year 2 have been creating digital art work based on a range of artists and styles.
- Year 3 have been creating animated scenes for their coding topic.
- Year 4 have been focusing on online safety and effective searching using the internet.
- Year 5 have been learning to simplify code and plan an algorithm as part of their coding topic.

Year 6 have been using coding programs to create short games for their peers to play.

We've also had a great time using devices for cross curricular work - from exploring the equator and polar habitats using google earth, researching geographical features of specific countries, and classifying animals based on their characteristics. Our new digital leader junior team for this year have been meeting and discussing our use of the internet, creating online safety posters and exploring fun and interactive websites that they can share with their classmates.

Children in Years 3-6 had the opportunity to take part in a national assembly hosted by Google this half term, learning about internet safety and how to make sure they keep their identity safe online. Parents also had the opportunity to join a virtual meeting hosted by NSPCC this half term, who gave information around social media, online bullying and parental controls. Our after-school Coding club is now up and running too! Children in Years 3 and 4 have been learning more about coding and using Scratch to create algorithms. They have had lots of fun creating mini animations by making changes to the sound, movement and appearance of their characters. - **Miss Lawrie**



Physical, Social, Health and Citizenship Education (PSHCE)

This term our topic of learning are "Dreams and Goals" and "Healthy Me". Our CAHMs Worker in Schools (CWIS) Annie has been working with us to support in growing a greater awareness of mental health. We are looking to offer parent consultations, giving you the opportunity to talk to someone. We also have Cansu Yilmaz EMHP (educational mental health practitioner) she led on managing emotions with our Year 2. Our Junior Mental Health Team (JMHT) have been busy promoting staff appreciation. They actively encouraged children to think about who have inspired, motivated and supported them. Year 5 & 6 will be taking part

Anthropology

Anthropology, though quiet in the Spring term for the children as the focus has been on DT, was fairly busy for staff involved. The Blossom Federation Anthropology Team and Teaching and Learning Team spent time finalising the topics for Geography Spring 2 and History in Summer 1.

The upcoming Geography topic will be extra exciting as children will be engaging in a curriculum that has had a makeover! In the last year's Spring School Development Newsletter, I wrote about how the federation Teaching and Learning leads alongside the Anthropology leads were revamping the geography and history curriculum to guarantee that there is full curriculum coverage as well as the curriculum progresses from one year to the next. This has finally been completed!

Year Is who have been looking mostly at their local area for the majority of the year will begin to look at the wider world and learn about the rest of the world outside Hackney and the UK. Year 2s will



continue their study of the non-European country, Australia. This has been a fantastic fun filled topic for the last couple years, which always boasts lots of great discussions in class. Year 3s will be looking at volcanoes, previously a Year 5 topic, and the affects that volcanoes have on landscape, farming and tourism. Year 4s will be learning about Rivers including the Water Cycle, previously a Year 6 topic. They will be studying two major rivers, The River Thames and The Ganges, as well as learning about how rivers are part of the water cycle. Rather than Year 6s doing a case study on a country in Europe, Year 5s have now been tasked with doing a deep dive into Turkey where they'll be looking into physical and human geographical aspects of the country. Finally, our Year 6's new topic is "The Globe - Mapping the Earth". This should be a fantastic round up of the learning journey children at Daubeney go through as aspects of learning from each year group can be found in this topic.

Some changes have also been made in the history curriculum, mainly the removal of the Kings and Queens topic in Year 5 replaced by a topic on the Windrush, marking a significant turning point in British history. More of this will be discussed in the Summer School Development Newsletter.—**Ms Cheung**

The inclusion offer continues to grow marvellously; we are so excited to have welcomed our therapy dog – Blue, to help support the additional needs of so many of our children. Research has shown the many benefits of therapy and reading dogs in school settings and thus we have introduced the access to a dog, to promote the emotional well-being, curiosity and engagement of our vulnerable pupils. Finally, with the amazing support of Sarah Twite, mother of two fabulous pupils at Daubeney, we are delighted to have embarked on our journey to achieve the Prem Aware Award. Research tells us that children born prematurely are more likely to have poorer academic attainment and special educational needs compared to their classmates born at full term. The cognitive and learning difficulties most commonly associated with premature birth include slower processing speeds, difficulties with memory, poorer visual-spatial skills, attention difficulties and struggles with mathematics. If you have personal experience of premature birth or are aware of anyone who may have experienced this – kindly contact our Deputy Head Teacher and SENDCO - Mr Dharma.

Religious Education (RE)

RE at Daubeney continues to be successful in allowing children to explore lives and cultures of people through studying their religion. Some standard topics in the Saxi

Some standout topics in the Spring term included: Year I learning about Islam, Year 2s learning about what it means for a Christian to belong to the church and Year 5s exploring the beliefs and values of Sikhism. Looking forward, Summer I will be a particularly exciting half term for RE at Daubeney as each year group will be going on a trip to a different place of worship. Teachers are beginning to plan for these trips, which will take place throughout the Summer I half term.—Ms Cheung
