


The Newsletter team went to visit our Daubeney Nursery to find out what a day in Nursery was like.


Year 6 were delighted to have been visited by two inspiring members of the Guardian newspaper team and learning about the exciting world of journalism and the media. The workshop involved children thinking about what it means to be a journalist and what is involved in getting a newspaper ready each day for the next day. Year 6 were also enthralled to learn that, in just a few years of development, the Guardian website has reached a staggering 10 million regular visitors, with the top story of 2016 being the US Presidential Election campaign, which had over 14 million visits to Guardian.com!

The children also got to plan a thought provoking news story about Pokemon Go in Taiwan.

The session ended with the journalists advising Year 6 to read and write as much as they can if they would like to pursue a career as journalists and a top tip - the Guardian (and many other newspapers) are seriously in need of science journalists and journalists who can create stories from numerical data! Year 3 read 'Farther' by Grahame Baker-Smith and innovated the text to create their own versions of the story. They designed and labelled their own machines and presented them to the class in groups!
