Tome Learning at Daubeney

Home Learning is an activity that should enhance your child's experience so at Daubeney the activities we give all children are based on skills that will be useful and help them to learn during class time.

Years R ,1 and 2 children should have 1 hour per week of home learning and this should be reading, spelling or/and number work.

In our school we expect our Key Stage 1 children to learn spellings, their number bonds and to read nightly

Reception: Every Friday you will receive a leaflet containing information of what your nild will be learning the following week. Ideas and activities are given for you to help support

Year 1 and Year 2: Each half term you will receive a curriculum leaflet. This will give you information on what the children will be learning within that term.

In our experience the most effective kind of study/play/activity at home might in-

- Read together and discuss the story
- Make up your own stories together
- V isit the library and join if you have not done so already explore a favourite topic/school topic together
- Talk together about everything!
- Make books: Scrapbooks (using pictures from catalogues, magazines, comics, photo-
- graphs, postcards etc.) Picture alphabet books
- Have pencils, paper, glue, crayons and scissors to hand for list making, note and letter iting and story writing
- Let your child get messy use finger paints, make play dough, papier mache, or make models out of junk and boxes
- Learn new songs, poems and rhymes together
- Have a dressing up box
- Play board games like Scrabble, Snakes and Ladders or dominoes
- Cook together. Read recipes and write shopping lists.
- Walk around the supermarket or local shop reading signs or using numbers that can be
- Play a game or creative activity
- Act together make up plays or characters

We believe that children need time to relax and play when they get home and 20 minutes of reading, spelling or number work is more than sufficient, any additional activities you do with your child will be of ber

ome Learning at Daubeney

Homelearning is an activity that should enhance your child's progress so at Daubeney the activities we give all children are based on learning skills that will be useful and help to them during class time.

Years 3 and 4 children should have 1.5 hours of home learning per week which should be linked to literacy and numeracy activities such as spelling, reading and learning tables, with occasional projects such as independent research in other areas.

Years 5 and 6 children should have 30 minutes per day with an emphasis on literacy and numeracy with occasional projects such as independent research or creative writing.

In our school we expect our children to learn spellings and their times tables and to read nightly. In Year 6 the homework is much heavier and based around factual information.

ach half term you will receive a curriculum leaflet. This will give you nformation on what the children will be learning within that term.

In our experience the most effective kind of work at home is:

- Reading to an adult and discussing the story
- Talking to an adult about their day
- An interactive activity with an adult, such as cooking or painting
- Playing a game or creative activity
- Independent learning and research

We believe that children need time to relax and play when they get home and 30 minutes per night is an adequate amount of work time. Any activities you do with your child will be beneficial.

If your child has difficulties in class or needs practice in a particular skill the teacher may give an activity to be completed at home: this is the decision of the teacher.

Please ensure your child brings their book bag to school everyday. Each week, your child will bring home a reading book and a home-school reading book. The home-school reading book enables you to inform the class teacher of your child's reading and any comments/questions you wish to make.


